



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

The Maritime Trends 2023 conference, hosted by Marine Tours at the beautiful Divani Apollon Palace & Thalasso, was an incredible gathering of industry leaders and enthusiasts. With around 200 delegates in attendance, including distinguished speakers and active participants, the event buzzed with excitement and meaningful discussions. Two Propellerists were even part of the event, with Steven Jones and Dr Robyn Pyne sharing their views.

The conference was divided into two sessions, exploring technical and financial trends in the maritime industry. From decarbonisation efforts to the evolving ship finance landscape, the discussions delved into crucial aspects shaping the industry's future. The focus on Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) angles highlighted the growing significance of people and legislation in maritime operations.

The importance of people, both onshore and at sea, took center stage. Presentations on leadership development, the human side of shipping, and the SKILLSEA initiative emphasized the need for highly skilled maritime professionals equipped with digital and green economy skills. Collaboration between shipping companies, shipowners' associations, unions, and education providers across Europe underpinned the ambition to inspire the next generation.

The conference also marked a recalibration of relationships and engagement, bridging gaps amidst the complexities of Brexit. The unity of vibrant EU shipping professionals, with the UK finding its place, generated a positive atmosphere of shared goals and collaboration.

One highlight of the event was the discussion of the Seafarers Happiness Index, an initiative founded in partnership with the Mission to Seafarers, Idwal, NorthStandard, and Inmarsat. The index provided valuable insights into the well-being and challenges faced by seafarers, offering a sense of scale and direction for industry issues.

The presentations emphasised the translation of seafarer insights into solutions, aligning with the changing finance landscape and the growing focus on crew issues within ESG frameworks. It was clear that effective management of change and proactive risk mitigation were essential in this evolving operational environment.

Finally, the conference addressed the impact of artificial intelligence (AI) and ChatGPT in the shipping industry. The value of expertise and the ability to ask the right questions were highlighted, as AI relies on human knowledge to effectively navigate complex situations.

The overwhelming positivity and diversity at the conference left a lasting impression. Young professionals, a majority of whom were women, demonstrated their dedication to learning, sharing ideas, and shaping the future of shipping. It was evident that the industry is in safe hands with passionate individuals who deeply care about the well-being of people, the quality of societies, and the profitability of the maritime sector.

As we move forward, the maritime industry will continue to embrace happiness and engagement as essential trends, fostering a bright and prosperous future for all involved.

SETTING A COURSE FOR SEAFARER SOLUTIONS



Propeller Club Members descended on Singapore Maritime Week and hosted an Executive Roundtable on Crew Welfare. The event was facilitated by Propellerists Steven Jones and Sue Henney doing their day jobs for the Seafarers Happiness Index and Idwal respectively. They were joined by around 20 senior industry leaders to discuss the issues facing seafarers globally.

The Mission to Seafarers Executive Roundtable on Crew Welfare was a meeting held in Singapore on Tuesday, April 25, 2023. The event was sponsored by Idwal and Standard Club, part of NorthStandard, and supported by Inmarsat. The roundtable was attended by an invited panel of leading ship owners, managers, and charterers who discussed how to improve the welfare of seafarers.

The roundtable was organised by The Mission to Seafarers, a charity that provides support to seafarers around the world. The charity's Director of Development, Jan Webber, said that the event was an opportunity to "translate the information that already exists in the industry, from the Seafarers Happiness Index and other initiatives, into real action that will improve crew conditions for seafarers, for the companies and, ultimately, for the industry."

The roundtable discussed a range of issues affecting seafarers, including mental health, loneliness, and the challenges of working long hours away from home. The panelists also discussed the importance of data and research in improving crew welfare.

The roundtable concluded with a call for action from the maritime industry. The panelists urged stakeholders to work together to improve the welfare of seafarers and to make the industry a more attractive career choice.

CONGRATULATIONS TO MARITIME UK NEW CEO



Central to our national industry is Maritime UK. This is a non-profit trade association and the representative body for the UK maritime sector. The UK's maritime sector comprises shipping, ports, marine (leisure, shipbuilding, technology and science) and maritime business services. Maritime contributes around £46.1bn to the UK economy and supports over 1,000,000 jobs. Maritime UK is registered at Companies House as The Maritime Industries of the United Kingdom.

Under Maritime UK, which was formed in 2017 by the merger of the UK Chamber of Shipping, the British Ports Association, and the UK Marine Trade Organisation, the industry is able to lobby and work towards unified aims.

Nationally and internationally, the organisation's mission is to "champion and work to enable a thriving maritime sector". Maritime UK represents the UK maritime sector at a national and international level, and works to promote the UK as a world-leading maritime nation.

The organisation's activities include:

 Representing the UK maritime sector to government, regulators, and other stakeholders

- Promoting the UK maritime sector to international markets
- Providing information and advice to the UK maritime sector
- Developing and delivering development programmes for the UK maritime sector, such as those on diversity.
- Supporting research and development in the UK maritime sector
- Promoting the UK maritime sector as a career choice

Until recently the CEO was Ben Murray who has done an amazing job to build the organisation to where it currently sits. Having moved on, the role needed to be illed and who better than Mersey Maritime's own Chris Shirling-Rooke MBE? Who was appointed MBE for services to maritime. He is passionate about the sector making a positive impact economically, socially and environmentally and ensuring the UK remains a leading maritime nation on the global stage.

In his new position these passions will be translated into the Maritime UK focus. We wish him and the organisation every success.



The term Battle of the Atlantic was coined by Winston Churchill to describe the protracted struggle by the Allies to secure shipping routes across the Atlantic. It was the longest continuous military campaign in World War Two, masterminded at a secret bunker in Liverpool, now the Western Approaches HQ Museum, on Rumford Street.

The Battle of the Atlantic was the most complex naval battle in history, and arguably, Britain and our allies' greatest achievement of World War II. For five years, eight months and five days, Allied and Axis powers fought for control of vital shipping routes across the Atlantic Ocean. Success kept Britain supplied with food, fuel and vital resources. Without it there would have been no D-Day, no Bomber Command raids, no transatlantic supplies to the Russian front, or indeed, a North African Campaign.

May 2023 marked the 80th Anniversary of the end of the Battle, and there was an incredible host of events in Liverpool to both remember the sacrifices, but to celebrate victory and the remaining veterans ttoo.

Liverpool, once again, as it has been on other key anniversaries was the focal point of the events. Across the Bank Holiday weekend in May (26, 27 and 28th), there were many events held around the city, featuring the opening of a new remembrance garden by HRH The Princess Royal, a gala dinner and also a military village, drumhead service, concert, memorial flight fly past and vessel salute.

Many Propeller Club Liverpool members had family who served in the Battle, both Royal and Merchant Navy, and this was an incredibly moving and proud time. So many of you joined in, and it was fantastic to see you at the Pier Head.

It was especially significant for Propeller Club Liverpool as our own Propellerists Anneley Pickles and Louise McWatt were instrumental in project managing the whole event.

What an event it was - and we are so glad we were able to remember 80 years on the sacrifces and efforts of so many. BZ to all.



DON'T FEED THE MARITIME TROLLS

In Propeller Club Liverpool we are blessed with wise heads

who like to support and share their knowledge. Elsewhere that

isn't always the case, and we have been bothered by the sad

realisation that people don't always want to help.

One of the best things about working in the maritime industry is the fact that it is so ripe for new ideas and thinking. The worst bit is the tendency for entrenched ideas to push back. This is especially true when older heads sometimes think that there is more value in playing "whack a mole" to the visions for change, posturing and trying to justify either their own beliefs or deep-rooted views.

Unfortunately, we have noticed a just such a worrying and disappointing trend of late. I call it the rise of the living dead... where leaders from the past decide to come out and dismiss or decry the efforts of others.

These zombies seemingly hunting out new ideas and innovations, so they can feast on the brains and hearts of those trying to do good things. LinkedIn seems to be an especially important hunting ground for the zombie leaders – they can sit back on the cushioned comfort of the plaudits of the past and pass ill-informed judgements and calls on all manner of topics.

With no real skin in the game, they can flail and condemn as much as they like. Though this is not solely an online phenomenon – in committee meetings and board rooms, I have sadly looked on as respected senior after respected former leader gets the wrong end of the stick and runs off with it like a rottweiler, shaking innovation to death.

It is all the more damaging and disappointing because we need the lessons of the past to be shared, and we desperately need the shoulders of giants to stand upon as we look to make positive change. To be told that a project will never start, and if it does start it will never finish is not overly constructive.

We need to find, somehow, the mechanism that allows young, yes maybe inexperienced people to bring forth ideas, visions, plans and schemes, and to have them supported and guided to success. Not cut down like so many green shoots meeting a Flymow.

For those trying to drive change to have access to wisdom, to be able to learn the lessons of past ventures, and to know

how we have reached certain points is vitally important. I value so much the knowledge of those who have gone before, just as I recognise the importance of the energy of those on the rise.

Ideas need nurturing, visions need focusing not blocking. Those who have held senior positions, and those who have the knowledge, contacts and insights need to be encouraged to share, not to flex what is left of their corporate muscle to bemoan, decry, dismiss and even troll. That is no use or help to anyone.

As global shipping trouble-shooter James Wilkes commented, "It is easy to say 'No' to new ideas and fresh viewpoints". He has a great rule for everyone around the table, you have to find five positive things to say about an idea before you're allowed to say one negative thing. Framing a discussion that way, he says gets more productive outcomes. Certainly sounds better than the alternative of five negatives before even thinking of any positives that some pursue.

My message across the generations would be that if you feel there are lessons to be learned from past efforts, then share them. If there are different approaches which can work, then raise them and help guide success. Just because something didn't work in 1979 does not mean that it cannot work today. Conversely, perhaps we need to make sure we are better at bringing everyone into things together. But until then, we all have a responsibility to either be helpful or silent.

No one needs to know someone thinks your idea is flawed, they need to know how it can be made to work! There is of course value in spotting problems, but that value is exponentially increased if such wisdom can also deliver solutions too.

So, if in doubt be positive, be supportive, if you have concerns ask for more information, and if you have lessons to share, share them. Don't be a Dooku, be a Yoda, and good things you might bring.

VLCC VISITOR TO THE MERSEY

Recently for the first time in a decade a VLCC, SEA PEARL docked into Tranmere port. Which was a big deal in many ways - and thanks to our tame photographer Al Disley for heading out to capture the landmark arrival.

The arrival of such a vessel is indicative of the vital role played by the Mersey, Tranmere Oil Terminal and of course Stanlow refinery, which is owned by Essar Oil (UK). This colossal acility that plays a crucial role in the UK's road fuel supply. Producing a staggering 16% of the nation's road fuel, this refinery operates tirelessly, receiving a whopping 9 million tonnes of crude oil annually in the Mersey estuary.

The docking point at Tranmere Oil Terminal is a sight to behold for those who visit Liverpool's iconic waterfront. The terminal acts as a vital hub, receiving around 9 million tonnes of crude oil annually from oil fields situated in the North Sea, the Mediterranean, and West Africa.

Once the oil is unloaded, it embarks on a 15-mile journey through a pipeline, transporting it to the Stanlow refinery located in Ellesmere Port.

The arrival of such a vessel is of paramount importance in maintaining a robust and secure fuel supply for the United Kingdom. These colossal vessels, with their massive cargo capacities, bring significant advantages to the country's energy landscape.



We held a special Women in Maritime celebration for First Thursday in June - and we thank all who came along. Stone Marine Shipcare's Gareth Gilbert has been donning his tweed with leather arm patches to become a Battle of the Atlantic historian over the weeks leading the BoA80 commemoration. He has done sterling work in the company's archives finding out just how important the wartime contribution of J. Stone & Co. Ltd and Manganese Bronze & Brass Co. Ltd was to ships and aircraft engaged in the Battle of the Atlantic and World War Two.

From the archives, when reviewing the records & documentation, it was seen that whatever the individual difficulties may have been for those working in the factories & foundries, laboratories, design & planning offices, ARP & LDV units, none of them ever viewed their war contribution as being comparable to those fighting on land, sea or air.

From 1939 to 1945, J. Stone & Co. and Manganese Bronze & Brass Co. worked around the clock to produce many items for the war effort.

One key item was propellers, as you may have expected. However the sheer scale of production is staggering...they produced 22,000 propellers.

From the records we can confidently say that nearly all the Royal Navy vessels engaged in the Battle of the Atlantic operated propellers manufactured by Stones & Manganese Bronze Brass Co.

It was not just about propellers, but people too. The 2nd National Service Act (1941) had brought far more women into the workplace and this certainly is true for the Stones & Manganese Bronze & Brass facilities around the country.

As well as manufacturing for seaborn warfare – the men & women of Stones wartime factories played a significant role in the production of some of the great wartime aircraft.

For companies strongly rooted in #maritime you would be forgiven for not expecting this series of posts to include the words Rolls Royce Merlin Engine, AVRO Lancaster Bomber & De Havilland Mosquito but there is a strong connection with these famous aircraft.

In 1942, J. Stone & Co. received a request from the Ministry of Aircraft Production to invest and extend their capacity to manufacture magnesium castings. This request came with a warning – due to the shortage of labour there would be no new skilled workers.

It was recognised that this aspect of manufacture – casting, traditionally a highly skilled and heavy manual process now needed to be undertaken predominantly by women – many of whom had never even seen inside a factory before.

New manufacturing plants were developed that reduced to a minimum the manual movement of materials – direct line of flow was introduced with conveyor belts and automated lifting.

Below is by no means a comprehensive list of items but includes some of the most recognizable recipients for the items Stone manufactured:

- De Havilland Mosquito variable pitch propeller parts, undercarriage & bomb winches.
- Bristol Hercules engine parts for the following bombers:
 Lancaster, Sterling, Halifax, Wellington & Beaufighters
- Rolls Royce Merlin & Griffin Engine Parts & Assemblies
- Hawker Typhoon & Tempest Engine Parts & Assemblies
- Supermarine Seafire Engine Parts & Assemblies

Also within the production demands from the Ministry was the matter of rivets for aircraft production.

Despite the early disruption of the Blitz the Stones plant at Deptford and a duplicate plant in Ardwick, production of over 3,400 tons of rivets was completed in the six wartime years using over 167,000 miles of rivet wire.

It is without doubt a testament to the commitment, courage and quick learning of these women who worked the factories that these production lines were delivered so successfully.

MARITIME TRAUMA

Our very own Captain Terry Ogg and Dr Rachel Glynn-Williams attended the Spinnaker Maritime People & Culture Conference in London, recently. This was an opportunity to discuss their innovative and market leading "Trauma-informed approaches to critical incidents at sea".

Trauma-informed approaches to critical incidents at sea are a way of thinking about and responding to these incidents that takes into account the psychological impact on those involved. This approach recognizes that critical incidents can be very stressful and can lead to a range of emotional and psychological reactions, including post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

A trauma-informed approach to critical incidents at sea involves:

- Providing support to those involved: This can include providing emotional support, practical help, and information about resources.
- Creating a safe and supportive environment: This can involve providing a space where people can feel safe to talk about their experiences and to receive support.
- Educating people about trauma: This can help people to understand the impact of trauma and to develop coping mechanisms.
- Integrating trauma-informed practices into all aspects of maritime operations: This can help to create a culture of safety and support.

Led by the efforts of Ogg and Glynn-Williams, there is a growing body of evidence that trauma-informed approaches can be effective in reducing the negative impact of critical incidents on those involved. These approaches can help to improve mental health, reduce stress, and increase resilience.

This is not just some nice to have, it can make a huge difference when it comes to incident debriefing, allowing those involved in a critical incident to talk about their experiences and to receive support from a trained professional.

The process also includes:

- Peer support: This is a system where seafarers can provide support to each other.
- Training: This can include training on how to recognize the signs of trauma, how to provide support to those who have been traumatized, and how to create a safe and supportive environment.
- Policies and procedures: These can include policies on how to respond to critical incidents, how to provide support to those who have been traumatised, and how to create a safe and supportive environment.

Trauma-informed approaches can help to improve the mental health and well-being of seafarers and can help to create a safer and more supportive environment for all.

Their trauma-informed practice acknowledges human responses to stress and trauma and minimises the risk of further harm in the interview process, which in turn sits within a broader Crew Wellbeing Continuum through which we can prepare, support and guide organisations and crews through responding to and recovering effectively from an incident at sea.

The Liverpool Shipwreck & Humane Society makes honorary awards of medals, parchments, certificates and letters of commendation to people who voluntarily put their own lives or safety at risk by saving or attempting to save other people who are in danger in cases of shipwreck, drowning, fire or any other hazards.

The LSHS has inaugurated a new annual award for maritime safety is named after the MV Derbyshire. The vessel was a Liverpool ship that was tragically lost on 9 September 1980 during Typhoon Orchid, south of Japan. She is the largest British ship to have been lost at sea, with the deaths of 42 crew members, plus two wives. For decades, the MV Derbyshire families focused not just on justice for their loved ones, but on the wider issues of maritime standards and safety, seeking to ensure that no more innocent lives are lost at sea.

It is hoped that the award is a fitting reminder of the importance of maritime safety, and will also keep the name of the vessel and those who were tragically lost in the our minds for years to come. Mr. Tony Jones, chair of the LS&HS, said: "The MV Derbyshire Award reflects the focus of the Derbyshire families, and Survitec's Seahaven inflatable lifeboat was chosen as the winner of the 2022 MV Derbyshire Award as it encompasses all that is important in developing solutions for safety at sea."

The first award was issued to Survitec for their Seahaven escape system. LHSH representatives were thrilled to be able to present Survitec VP, Innovation, Mr. Stewart


Gregory, with the MV Derbyshire Award for Maritime Safety at Survitec's Birkenhead offices on the banks of the River Mersey. Mr. Gregory, designer and inventor of the Seahaven AES, was also accompanied by several other members of the team.

The judges felt the world's largest inflatable lifeboat solution was not just innovative, but that it challenged the previously held concepts of maritime safety, especially for mass evacuation. It is also a hugely visible and significant statement of the importance of saving lives at sea. Mr. Jones added: "This pioneering approach to maritime safety reflects the values of the LS&HS, as it pushes the boundaries of life saving."

Receiving the award, Mr. Gregory said: "Over the past 100 years, at Survitec, we have demonstrated our commitment to innovation, investment and development of Survival Technology for those who rely and depend on it. We are extremely pleased to collect this award from the Liverpool Shipwreck and Humane Society, recognising Survitec's purpose; We Exist to Protect Lives."

The North West region has been long renowned for both its shipping history and also its maritime innovation, and now the Liverpool Shipwreck and Humane Society, formed in 1839, has launched this award for which nominations are now open again.

John Gow of Jensen Hughes has recently spoken on the issue of lithium-ion batteries at sea, and the hazards they bring to the industry. Much research is being undertaken to ascertain how lithium-ion batteries and electric vehicles can be safely transported, and should the need arise, how to manage a thermal or fire event. There are different views about the complexities and dangers associated with transporting this type of cargo. On one end of the scale, there is little difference between a fire involving electric vehicles compared to a fire in a vehicle with an internal combustion engine. On the other end, some might say from 'real world experience' that the hazards are significant and vessels and crew are ill-equipped to deal with the event.

Looking at this from John's perspective as a former firefighter and current marine casualty investigator, he sees there is a gap in knowledge between the research field and the experiences of emergency responders. If we are to improve not only consumer safety but also the safety of those seafarers who transport goods around the globe, there needs to be much closer alignment between the two worlds.

THE BOA80 LECTURE SERIES



As part of the build up to the Battle of the Atlantic commemorations, a lecture series was held in Liverpool to focus on key aspects of not just the battle, nor even the second world war -but to look at what they meant, and the modern day impacts that we continue to feel.

Held across a number of weeks, and shifting between St Nicholas Church and The Athenaeum, the lectures brought both the maritime community and public together to ponder key issues such as international relations, communications and technology, and the role of war itself in shaping peace.

Speakers included, Understanding our Enemy, by Sir Clive Johnstone. Clive's lecture looked at the Russian Navy and why understanding it (and other Navy's) better matters. He will link this thread with current and historic examples of insight and also of ignorance. He will use one of his examples the Battle of Atlantic – highlighting the role that Liverpool, the Royal Navy and Merchant Navy, and WATU played in the Allies eventual victory.

Linton Roberts looked at Cammell Laird: World War II to the Present Day, and gave a fascinating and impassioned view of the role of the yard through history, and the incredibe work produced for the war effort. But also in peace too, with a focus on the importance of skills and investment to keep building, literally and metaphorically, on the importance of ship building.

The author Simon Parkin was on hand to provide a lecture about the role of the WRENs in the Battle of the Atlantic, and their role as "unsung heroes". While Wing Commander Steve Chaskin, talked of the incredible exploits of aircraft versus submarines. Something which came into more focus as the Fairey Swordfish somewhat stole the show at the Battle of the Atlantic events and fly pasts.

Our very own Steven Jones got in on the act. His presentation focused on the role of communications. As a former seafarer on cable vessels, he looked at the role of Cable and Wireless in war, but also on the future threats facing cables and infrastructure at sea.

Across the lectures there were hundreds of attendees, and it made a great build up to the main event of commemoration.
